

WEEKEND UPDATE

Earlier this week, I made a trip up to Philadelphia for a conference put on by our denomination's Board of Pensions (they ae making some significant changes to the health care options offered to pastors and their families starting next year). It was a quick trip — my flight left early Tuesday morning and I got back later Wednesday night — but since the conference was over after lunch, and my return flight didn't leave until 7:00, I had a few free hours in downtown Philly.

I figured I had two options to get a taste of the city: one, to get a literal "taste," I could find the nearest cheesesteak restaurant and get the city's namesake sandwich; or, two, I could find and tour the very place where our country got its start — Independence Hall. Fortunately, the hotel we were staying served make-your-own cheesesteaks for lunch, so after lunch, it was off to Independence Hall, which was only a little over a mile away, a place I had last visited almost 50 years ago.

Unfortunately, tickets were sold-out, but we (I and a colleague, Jon Haurwas, pastor of Skidaway Community Church) learned that you didn't have to have a ticket to see some parts of the national historic site: one of which was the Liberty Bell and the other was Congress Hall.

I was reminded that Philadelphia was the home of our federal government before it moved to Washington DC (and it was in New York City before Philadelphia for two years). Congress Hall, as the name implies, was the home of the House of Representatives and the Senate from 1790 - 1800.

Like many an old church or cathedral I have visited over the years, I felt I was walking on sacred ground. I was in the very rooms where so much history took place. It was in Congress Hall that three new states were added to the Republic (Vermont, Kentucky and Tennessee); the Bill or Rights was debated and ratified; and the peaceful transfer of power from our first president, George Washington, to our second, John Adams, took place. In addition, I was only steps away from where the Continental Congress met to sign the Declaration of Independence in 1776 and were the Constitutional Convention convened in 1787. In other words, so many of the principles and ideals that are at the foundation of our nation had their birth right there where I was.

At a time when our nation seems so fractured and polarized, I needed this reminder of these ideals and principles. While I believe there is always room for improvement, I also believe our nation is the best thing out there. I was inspired to re-read the Preamble to our Constitution that states:

We the People of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

While I don't want this (and other political documents) printed in my Bible, I do believe we – people of faith – should continue to strive for "a more perfect Union" as we work for justice and the general welfare for all of God's children, and in doing so "secure the blessings of liberty" for ourselves and our posterity.


